USDA REACHES ITS GOAL TO FUND \$250 MILLION IN SMART GRID IMPROVEMENTS

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced USDA has reached its \$250 million goal to finance smart grid technologies. Vilsack also announced nine rural electric cooperatives and utilities in 10. "Grid modernization and deployment of 'smart grid' technology will increase the reliability and efficiency of electric power generation," said Vilsack. "Providing reliable, affordable electrical service contributes to stronger rural economies and is the backbone for a prosperous rural America. These loans will help ensure that rural areas can retain existing businesses, support new ones and have reliable, up-to-date infrastructure."

As part of President Obama's *Blueprint for a Secure Energy Future*, the Administration has outlined a [framework](#) for a modernized electric system that will benefit all Americans. This framework lays out a number of public and private initiatives, including a goal of \$250 million in loans for smart-grid technology deployment as part of the USDA's Rural Utility Service, which is focused on upgrading the electric grid in rural America.

This latest announcement of more than \$27 million in smart grid investments has enabled USDA to meet President Obama's goal and further facilitated rural utilities to make efficiency

improvements to the electric grid that will help consumers lower their electric bills by reducing energy use in homes and businesses.

Vilsack said this \$250 million investment in loan funds for smart grid technologies means infrastructure investment at virtually no cost to the taxpayer. These technologies will facilitate the integration of renewable sources of electricity into the grid, help avoid blackouts and restore power quicker when outages occur, and reduce the need for new power plants. Smart grid technologies also provide a foundation for innovation by entrepreneurs and others who can develop tools to empower consumers and help them make informed decisions. A first generation of innovative consumer products and services—such as thermostats that can be controlled from a smart phone, or websites that show how much energy a house is using—can continue to help Americans save money on their electricity bills.

USDA MAKES GRANTS AVAILABLE TO IMPROVE HOUSING FOR FARM WORKERS

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that USDA is accepting applications for technical assistance grants to develop domestic and migrant farm labor housing. "These grants will help communities submit quality applications to increase their chances of getting funding to build much-needed affordable housing for farm workers," said Vilsack. "Increasing the supply of affordable housing in rural communities not only helps the residents, it helps the entire community."

Grants are available to organizations that will help housing authorities, state and local governments, Indian tribes, non-profit organizations, and community- and faith-based groups apply for loans and grants to build farmworker housing. The purpose of the grants is to increase the number of high-quality applications USDA receives. Vilsack announced on July 18 the Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for loans and grants to build or preserve affordable rental farm worker housing. This technical assistance funding is to organizations that assist potential borrowers under that NOFA.

Technical assistance grantees must have the knowledge, ability, expertise or practical experience necessary to develop and package farm labor housing loan and grant applications. They also will be required to submit a minimum number of applications to USDA, based on their location. - Updated food and physical activity databases that allow users to track foods and activities as accurately as possible
- An enhancement to allow users to set a personal calorie goal using the [My Top 5 Goals](#) feature
- Additional capabilities planned for release in 2013

The *SuperTracker's* million-user milestone comes as USDA highlights the fourth in a series of quarterly [consumer messages](#) supporting the MyPlate icon – *Make at Least Half Your Grains Whole Grains* – that USDA is promoting in conjunction with more than 6,000 organizations participating in the MyPlate [Nutrition Communicators Network](#).
