- 1) <u>CORRESPONDENCE</u>. Acknowledgement of Tribal Letters to USDA and USFS regarding the Black Hills National Forest.
- 2) <u>CONSULTATION PROCESSES</u>. How should the Black Hills National Forest structure regular tribal consultations?

Background: There are sixteen (<u>16) Tribes</u> in six (6) states (MT, WY, SD, ND, OK, and NE) with standing treaties and/or formal tribal equities with the Black Hills National Forest. .

Proposal: A proposal framework for consideration and discussion includes the following:

- Regular quarterly virtual meetings of the Chairmen, or their proxy, of all 16 Tribes to discuss regular ongoings of the BHNF and National Grasslands.
- One annual in-person meeting in the Black Hills, of the Chairmen, or their proxy, of all 16 Tribes.
- One staff from each of the 16 Tribes appointed the official Point of Contact for communications to assist with regular correspondence and organizing consultations.
- Targeted consultations on an as-needed-basis for special topics and actions, example <u>Black Hills National Forest Plan Revision Process.</u>

3) <u>CO-STEWARDSHIP</u>. Tribal Co-Stewardship Opportunities & Proposal

Background: Several Tribes have raised interest in co-stewardship opportunities, including in a 2021 letter to President Biden. The Forest Service welcomes the opportunity. However, no specific proposals have been presented to the Forest Service yet. In the interim, one first-step opportunity that many other Tribal nations are undertaking is the Interpretive contract at the Visitor's Center.

Proposal:

- The USFS welcomes specific tribal proposals for discussion of the wide variety of co-stewardship topics.
- The BHNF would like to discuss the potential of a tribal entity obtaining a contract for Interpretive Services for the Black Hills National Forest's Pactola Visitor's Center to tell the story of the Black Hills from the Tribal perspective.
