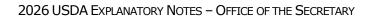
# **2026 USDA EXPLANATORY NOTES- OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY**

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#### **PREFACE**

This publication summarizes the fiscal year (FY) 2026 Budget for the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). Throughout this publication any reference to the "Budget" is in regard to the 2026 Budget, unless otherwise noted. All references to years refer to fiscal year, except where specifically noted. The budgetary tables throughout this document show actual amounts for 2023 and 2024, Full Year Continuing Resolution levels for 2025, and the President's Budget request for 2026. Amounts for 2025 estimated levels include: non-enacted amounts such as Full-Time Equivalent levels, fleet levels, information technology investment levels, recovery levels, transfers in and out, balances available end of year, and obligation levels.

Throughout this publication, the "2018 Farm Bill" is used to refer to the Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018. Most programs funded by the 2018 Farm Bill are funded through 2025, as extended by the American Relief Act, 2025 (P.L. 118-158, Division D). Amounts shown in 2025 and 2026 for most Farm Bill programs reflect those confirmed in the baseline.

Pursuant to the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, sequestration is included in the numbers for mandatory programs in 2023, 2024, 2025 and 2026.

In tables throughout this document, amounts equal to zero (0) are displayed as dashes (-). Amounts less than 0.5 and greater than zero are rounded and shown as a zero (0). This display treatment is used to prevent the masking of non-zero amounts that do not round up to one (1).

#### AGENCY-WIDE

#### **PURPOSE STATEMENT**

The Secretary, Chief of Staff, Under Secretaries, Assistant Secretaries, Executive Secretariat, and their immediate staff serve as the management team of the Department, responsible for administering and overseeing the organization's operations. This includes developing and guiding policies across all areas of the Department's responsibilities, such as research, education, regulatory activities, nutrition, conservation and farm programs, forestry, and international agriculture. Additionally, they maintain relationships with relevant organizations and stakeholders to support program development and act as liaisons with the Executive Office of the President and Members of Congress on matters related to Departmental policy.

The Office of the Secretary also oversees special projects that are conducted at the behest of Congress and the Administration. These projects include short-term studies, investigations, and research on matters affecting agriculture or the agricultural community. Project results are reported to the appropriate Congressional Committees.

The general authority of the Secretary to supervise and control the work of the Department is contained in the Organic Act (7 U.S.C. 2201-2202). The delegation of regulatory functions to the Department employees and authorization of appropriations to carry out these functions are contained in 7 U.S.C. 450c-450g. The authority of the Secretary to streamline and reorganize the Department is included in the Federal Crop Insurance Reform and Department of Agriculture Reorganization Act of 1994, Public Law 103-354.

The Office of the Secretary consists of the Immediate Office of the Secretary; Office of the Assistant Secretary for Congressional Relations; Office of the Assistant Secretary for Administration; Office of the Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights; Office of the Under Secretary for Research, Education, and Economics; Office of Under Secretary for Marketing and Regulatory Programs; Office of Under Secretary for Food Safety; Office of Under Secretary for Rural Development; Office of Under Secretary for Food, Nutrition, and Consumer Services; Office of Under Secretary for Farm Production and Conservation; Office of Under Secretary for Trade and Foreign Agricultural Affairs; Office of Codex Alimentarius; the Office of Tribal Relations; and Office of Under Secretary for Natural Resources and Environment.

OSEC is located in Washington, D.C. As of September 30, 2024, 120 full-time permanent employees were funded by appropriated funds (103) and the Working Capital Fund (17). Of the employees, 97 were in the headquarters office, and 23 were in the field offices.

#### ACCOUNT 1: OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY

#### **APPROPRIATIONS LANGUAGE**

The appropriations language follows (new language underscored):

# Office of the Secretary (Including Transfers of Funds)

For necessary expenses of the Office of the Secretary, \$42,696,000 of which not to exceed \$6,000,000 shall be available for the immediate Office of the Secretary; not to exceed \$1,896,000 shall be available for the Office of Homeland Security; not to exceed \$5,000,000 shall be available for the Office of Tribal Relations; not to exceed \$3,000,000 shall be available for the Office of Partnerships and Public Engagement, of which \$1,500,000 shall be for 7 U.S.C. 2279(c)(5); not to exceed \$18,300,000 shall be available for the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Administration, of which \$17,000,000 shall be available for Departmental Administration to provide for necessary expenses for management support services to offices of the Department and for general administration, security, repairs and alterations, and other miscellaneous supplies and expenses not otherwise provided for and necessary for the practical and efficient work of the Department: *Provided*, That funds made available by this Act to an agency in the Administration mission area for salaries and expenses are available to fund up to one administrative support staff for the Office; not to exceed \$3,500,000 shall be available for the Office of Assistant Secretary for Congressional Relations and Intergovernmental Affairs to carry out the programs funded by this Act, including programs involving intergovernmental affairs and liaison within the executive branch; and not to exceed \$5,000,000 shall be available for the Office of Communications: Provided further, That the Secretary of Agriculture is authorized to transfer funds appropriated for any office of the Office of the Secretary to any other office of the Office of the Secretary: Provided further, That no appropriation for any office shall be increased or decreased by more than 5 percent: Provided further, That not to exceed \$22,000 of the amount made available under this paragraph for the immediate Office of the Secretary shall be available for official reception and representation expenses, not otherwise provided for, as determined by the Secretary: Provided further, That the amount made available under this heading for Departmental Administration shall be reimbursed from applicable appropriations in this Act for travel expenses incident to the holding of hearings as required by 5 U.S.C. 551-558: Provided further, That funds made available under this heading for the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Congressional Relations and Intergovernmental Affairs shall be transferred to agencies of the Department of Agriculture funded by this Act to maintain personnel at the agency level: Provided further, That no funds made available under this heading for the Office of Assistant Secretary for Congressional Relations may be obligated after 30 days from the date of enactment of this Act, unless the Secretary has notified the Committees on Appropriations of both Houses of Congress on the allocation of these funds by USDA agency.

#### Office of the Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights

For necessary expenses of the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights, \$1,000,000:

Provided, That funds made available by this Act to an agency in the Civil Rights mission area for salaries and expenses are available to fund up to one administrative support staff for the Office.

#### Office of the Under Secretary for Research, Education and Economics

For necessary expenses of the Office of the Under Secretary for Research, Education, and Economics, \$1,000,000: Provided, That funds made available by this Act to an agency in the Research, Education, and Economics mission area for salaries and expenses are available to fund up to one administrative support staff for the Office.

#### Office of the Under Secretary for Marketing and Regulatory Programs

For necessary expenses of the Office of the Under Secretary for Marketing and Regulatory Programs, \$1,200,000: Provided, That funds made available by this Act to an agency in the Marketing and Regulatory Programs mission area for salaries and expenses are available to fund up to one administrative support staff for the Office.

### Office of the Under Secretary for Food Safety

For necessary expenses of the Office of the Under Secretary for Food Safety, \$800,000: Provided, That funds made available by this Act to an agency in the Food Safety mission area for salaries and expenses are available to fund up to one administrative support staff for the Office.

#### Office of the Under Secretary for Farm Production and Conservation

For necessary expenses of the Office of the Under Secretary for Farm Production and Conservation, \$1,000,000: Provided, That funds made available by this Act to an agency in the Farm Production and Conservation mission area for salaries and expenses are available to fund up to one administrative support staff for the Office.

#### Office of the Under Secretary for Rural Development

For necessary expenses of the Office of the Under Secretary for Rural Development, \$1,000,000: Provided, That funds made available by this Act to an agency in the Rural Development mission area for salaries and expenses are available to fund up to one administrative support staff for the Office.

#### Office of the Under Secretary for Food, Nutrition and Consumer Services

For necessary expenses of the Office of the Under Secretary for Food, Nutrition, and Consumer Services, \$800,000: *Provided*, That funds made available by this Act to an agency in the Food, Nutrition and Consumer Services mission area for salaries and expenses are available to fund up to one administrative support staff for the Office.

#### Office of the Under Secretary for Trade Foreign and Agriculture Affairs

For necessary expenses of the Office of the Under Secretary for Trade and Foreign Agricultural Affairs, \$614,000: Provided, That funds made available by this Act to any agency in the Trade and Foreign Agricultural Affairs mission area for salaries and expenses are available to fund up to one administrative support staff for the Office.

#### **Office of Codex Alimentarius**

For necessary expenses of the Office of Codex Alimentarius, \$3,300,000, including not to exceed \$40,000 for official reception and representation expenses.

#### Office of the Under Secretary for Natural Resources and Environment

For necessary expenses of the Office of the Under Secretary for Natural Resources and Environment, \$750,000: *Provided*, That funds made available by this Act to any agency in the Natural Resources and Environment mission area for salaries and expenses are available to fund up to one administrative support staff for the office.

# JUSTIFICATION OF CHANGES

### Office of the Secretary

Base Funds allow the Office of the Secretary to oversee the general management of the department and provide the principal support to the Secretary and the Department in formulating policy and program leadership. The Secretary of Agriculture, assisted by the Deputy Secretary, Under and Assistant Secretaries, and members of their immediate staff, directs and coordinates the work of the Department.

Base funding for the Office of the Secretary is necessary to ensure continued policy direction for all areas of the Department including research, educational and regulatory activities, nutrition, conservation, trade, farm groups, forestry, and international agriculture; maintain relationships with organizations and others in the development of programs; and maintain liaisons with the Executive Office of the President and members of Congress on all matters pertaining to Department policy.

The numbers and letters of the following listing relates to values in the Change (Chg) Key column of the Project Statement:

#### Justification of Decreases:

- (1) A decrease of \$8,344,000 and 26 FTEs in salaries and expenses for the Office of the Secretary (\$35,608,000 and 103 FTEs available in 2025).
  - A) A decrease of \$8,344,000 and 26 FTEs for base funding for the Office of the Secretary. In pursuit of streamlining workforce efforts, facilities, and other government efficiencies, the Office of the Secretary has reduced staff from 103 to 77. At this level, the Office of the Secretary will continue to provide general management of the department and provide principal support to the Secretary and the Department to formulate policy and program leadership.
