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SUBJECT: **Resources for Procuring Local Foods in School Year 2026-2027**

TO: Regional Directors, Child Nutrition Programs, All Regions State Directors, Child Nutrition Programs, All States Child Nutrition Program Operators, All States

The purpose of this memorandum is to remind schools, sponsors, and institutions participating in any U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Child Nutrition Program (CNP), including the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), School Breakfast Program (SBP), Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program (FFVP), Special Milk Program for Children (SMP), Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP), Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), and the Seamless Summer Option (SSO), of the various resources available to help CNP operators procure local foods.

Background

The USDA, as directed by the **Richard B. Russell National School Lunch Act**, encourages CNP operators to implement farm to school programs that improve access to local foods. The Food and Nutrition Administration (FNA) supports CNP operators in reaching this goal through a variety of strategies, including technical assistance, best practice information, research and data, grants, and interdepartmental coordination of relevant resources and information.

Tools and Technical Assistance

[USDA Foods: A Resource for Buying Local](#)

USDA Foods support U.S. domestic agriculture and provide nutritious foods to schools aligned with the Dietary Guidelines for Americans. This includes a variety of high-quality fruits, vegetables, dairy products, whole grains, lean meats, and other protein options all grown and produced in the United States.

[USDA DoD Fresh Program: A Source for Locally Grown Produce](#)

As part of USDA Foods, USDA DoD Fresh helps increase access to fresh produce for schools. Through USDA DoD Fresh, vendors are encouraged to source local products, when possible, and are required to identify the State of Origin for each product in the Fresh Fruits and Vegetables Order Receipt System (FFAVORS). Schools can use this information to order local produce options using their USDA Foods entitlement. State agencies may use any amount of allocated entitlement funding for USDA Foods DoD Fresh purchases throughout the school year to best meet program needs, including support for local purchasing.

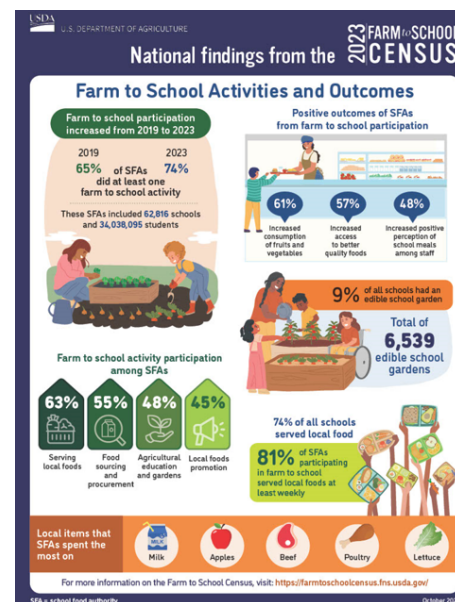

Farm to School Data and Statistics

FNA maintains the **largest public national dataset on farm to school activity** in the United States. [The Farm to School Census](#) (Census) is a periodic survey of all school food authorities (SFAs) active in the NSLP. Interested visitors can review Census responses to better understand the size and scope of farm to school activity at a national, State, and individual SFA level. The Census also includes additional products to help interpret findings:

- [2023 Farm to School Dataset and Findings](#) – Microsoft excel files that include all individual responses from SFA respondents, weighted summaries of national and state level responses, and codes to interpret data.
- [2023 Farm to School Census Infographics](#) – Two-page visual summaries of national and state level findings intended to help clarify key takeaways from the 2023 Census.
